Don't Skip the PIP

Many insurance agents and companies will tell you that Personal Injury Protection or "PIP" is unnecessary and will needlessly insurance your insurance premium. But why is this protection important

enough to make the Washington State Insurance Commission require agents to speak to clients about it?

Personal Injury Protection or PIP is "insurance coverage for medical and other expenses, such as wage loss and funeral expenses, which result from an auto accident, no matter who is at fault". (Washington State Insurance Commission)

PIP is one of the most important insurance coverage's to consider because it provides a direct benefit to you in the case of an accident. While the required insurance coverage only protects other people from you PIP enables you to protect yourself from other's negligence. The stress and hassle of rushing to settle a claim to help prevent you from going bankrupt can easily be prevented by carrying adequate Person Injury Protection limits.

To put it simply, PIP pays your medical bills after an accident, regardless of whose at fault for the accident.

PIP Is not the same as health insurance because you can see any medical professional you choose. There is no need for a referral or to see a doctor "in the network".

It is not required for drivers to have PIP, but the Washington State Insurance Commission does require insurance companies to offer this coverage to all insured. This has become a legal requirement because there have been a significant number of Washington Residents who have experienced a loss and regretted not having adequate personal injury protection. Learn from their mistakes. Empower yourself to be protected in an accident regardless of who is at fault. Empower yourself to protect your assets, and your family. When your agent asks you if you would like to purchase Personal Injury Protection, say yes!

Teen Driving Tips

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3. Constructive Comments:

Help your child become aware of road hazards by pointing them out while driving and calmly telling them the right course of action to take.

- **4. Don't Yell in the Car!:** Studies show that yelling at the new driver makes them nervous and hinders heir abilities. Calmly let them know how to deal with situations.
- **5. Review the Ride:** Each time you go out with them talk to them afterwards about the drive and provide a constructive critique- telling them the good and the bad.
- 6. Share the Responsibility: Have your child help share the costs of driving- paying for part of the insurance, gas etc. This will help them realize that nothing is free and give them a greater respect for their car and the road.
- **7.** Ride Periodically with Your Teen: Even after they get their license ride with them every so often to check out their driving skills.
- **8. Set Rules:** Set rules on nighttime driving, how many passengers may occupy the car and where they may

go with the car.

- **9. Create a Contract:** Outline the rules, conditions, restrictions and consequences if those rules are broken. With losing their license and freedom on the line they will think twice before racing their buddies or drinking and driving.
- 10. Set a Good Example: If you don't wear your seatbelt, use your cell phone while driving and are prone to road rage- how do you think your child will drive? Provide a steady example of the behavior you would like your child to exhibit behind the wheel.

Question: If I'm Involved in an Auto Accident What Should I Do?

There are a few mistakes people regularly make when in a car accident that can have a huge effect on their claim. If you keep these tips in mind it will make the process run a lot more smoothly.

- Collect Adequate Data from the 3.
 Accident. Names, phone numbers and addresses for ALL of the people involved in the acci
- dent including passengers is essential. Also take note of not only the license plates of the cars involved, but also of each cars make, model and color. If your cell phone is equipped with a camera it may be a good idea to take pictures of each of these items. And don't forget to collect each drivers insurance information. If any surveillance tapes or 911 tapes have record of the incident make sure you get someone investigating the accident ASAP before these are recorded over or lost.
- Don't Wait to See A Doctor. If you are injured from the accident you must see a doctor immediately. The case requires

- evidence ie. Doctors notes. If you do not seek medical attention quickly the insurance company will argue you were not truly injured.
- 4. Don't Exaggerate or Understate your Symptoms. Juries do not reward whiners or tough guys and both of these can hurt your case. If you overstate your injuries the jury will consider you untruthful and not want to help you— if you understate they will give you less than you should be receiving.

The Alphabet Game: This game can be played as teams or solo. Run through the alphabet in order by using the letters on License Plates, Road Signs, Billboards and Business' as you pass them along the trip. Anything qualifies so long as it is on your side of the car.

The Picnic Game: A great memory game with the challenge of getting through the alphabet. The game starts when a player says "I went to a picnic and this is what I brought..." then say a picnic item starting with the latter 'A'. This game follows with each person running through the entire list of items and adding on the next letter. "I went to a picnic and this is what I brought...an apple and some bananas" etc. The trick is to get through all 26 letters of the alphabet.

Counting Cows: This game is great for trips through the country. Each player counts the cows they see on their side of the car. If you pass a cemetery on your side of the car and another player yells "your cows are buried" you will have to start from the beginning again. The game can get interesting when distraction tactics are used to prevent cow counting.

Geography Game: Choose countries, cities, states, rivers, lakes or capitals. The first player lists a geographic area and the second person lists a similar geographic area that starts with the last letter of the previous word. For example: First listing: Michigan, the second person could list Nevada and the next word could be Alaska.

Virtual Hide and Seek: Players think of a place in their house and virtually hide there as the other player tries to guess where they are hiding. Since it is virtual players may make themselves as large or small as they like and can hide in silverware drawers, toilets, cabinets etc.

Scavenger Hunt: Compile a list of items to look for while on the trip. The list can be different depending on the area you are driving through. For example: In the country the list may be: grain silo, hay bales, cows, tractor, irrigation system, barn, deer, horse. While in the city the list may be: a billboard with a car on it, railroad tracks, flashing red light, church, license plate with an 'x' etc.
